Three Million Three Hundred and Sixty Seven Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty Four Euros...

The Finances in the Year 2015

... 3.367.834 Euros in numbers, they are a reason to say thank you to churches and private donors. That's how much we have received in donations in 2015. The year before it was 3.574.882 Euros. We've received a total of 4.162.033 Euros in 2015. With this money we were able to pay out almost all of our budgets. In some areas (e.g. Theological Seminary) we still had to cut the budget since we hadn't received sufficient ring-fenced donations. Since good stewardship and transparency are important to us, we held back on payments on one of our membership alliance due to

incomplete accounting. Our standard for our finances is our "Manual For Financial Transactions of EBM INTERNATIONAL", which all 29 member countries agreed on. You can gladly request a copy of this document at the mission's office. Also in 2015, we stayed clearly under the fixed limit for administration expenses. EBM INTERNATIONAL is examined by the German Evangelical Alliance according to the "Seal of Donation" who allow for administration expenses to be up to 25%. In 2015, our administration expenses were attested to be under 15%. Our goal to build up a back-up

which would last for 180 days hasn't been reached yet. We've come as far as 165 days. But with a good balance of commercial accomplishment and spiritual vision for our mission projects in four continents we'd like to reach this financial goal in the next two years. Once our annual account is accepted by our missionary council (annual member meeting) at the end of April, you'll be able to gladly request a copy.

Thank you for your donations, your prayers, and your encouragement.

Turkish Baptist Convention

Helping Refugees Connects Churches

There are four churches and two stationary churches as well as an Iranian church that now belong to the Turkish Baptist Convention. These churches are in good contact with each other. In 2015, the youths of all these churches came together for a camp. In addition to this, intensive menial work for Syrian and Iranian refugees also connects these churches. With donations from "German Baptist Aid", EBM INTERNATIONAL, and the aid organization "Help For Martyr Churches" lots of refugees were helped with food, medicine, fitments, and apartments. European Baptist Aid (the aid organization of the European Baptist Federation) led a training in February for the four churches so helping the refugees could be even more efficient and lasting.

Helping the refugees has publicity value for the churches: representatives of authorities and politicians are being invited to aid programs

and the media reports about it. This is of help to the minority (there are only 0.3% Christians in the Turkish population) to receive more recognition and protection. And still we keep on praying because Christians there

are still being excluded and discriminated against. We also ask for donations for the work in the churches which can only rent buildings for meetings under aggravating conditions. Only the church in Izmir has its "own" church whose maintenance exceeds the proportion of that church. Almost 300 people belong to those churches and the stationary churches which are being

In 1980, Hans Willem Oosterloo went to Sierra Leone as a volunteer. He quickly fell in love with the country and in 1982 he officially became a missionary of EBM INTERNATIONAL. Not only that: in Sierra Leone he also met his wife Aisha Oosterloo née Turray. In January 2016, after 35 years of ministry, this era has come to an end.

Hans Willem grew up in Limburg in the Netherlands and calls himself the “prodigal son”. After a turbulent youth in the hippy culture of the 1970’s, he came to know Jesus Christ and started asking intensely for God’s will in his life. He didn’t hesitate when he got the chance to go to Sierra Leone as a volunteer. Once in the country he started working as a teacher in Gbendembu with his long hair and beard which resembled well-known Jesus pictures. That’s where he met Aisha. Aisha was the daughter of an imam, and Aisha had become a Christian. A friendship between the two was initially very difficult due to Aisha’s family being against their relationship. In 1987 however, they got married in Lunsar which was only made possible by the mediation work of the founders of the Baptist Convention of Sierra Leone (BCSL), Rev. Mans (father of Linda Koroma).

During his ministry, Hans Willem took over a lot of duties in the area of administration and coordination of projects. Especially in the years from 1987-1995, he contributed immensely to the structures of the BCSL, and the work in Sierra Leone flourished. For a long time he also worked as a treasurer

of the BCSL, and from 1990 to 2015 he was the official representative of EBM in Sierra Leone. In the past two decades, both his wife and him have also been leading the mission station in Kingtom/Freetown.

Aisha was very much committed to the women’s outreach of the BCSL. Beyond that she also took care of the widows and women on the margins of society in Freetown. Out of this passionate work the vision of a house for widows started which was built thanks to many donations from the Dutch church in Lunsar. The house for the widows was finished in January 2016.

Hans Willem and Aisha will spend their retirement in their own home in Lunsar. There they also had a farewell ceremony at the conference of the BCSL in January 2016. It was an impressive event with guests from EBM INTERNATIONAL where the appreciation for the years of ministry and the handover of the house for the widows to the BCSL was marked. The Oosterloos were faithful and loyal to Sierra Leone and its people in the difficult years of the civil war and also in the recent Ebola crisis. We wish both of them wonderful and healthy years in their retirement and we are looking forward to a farewell celebration and the thanksgiving service during the missionary council in April 2016 in Arnhem, Netherlands.

What Has God Given us in this Place?

In November 2015, the Baptist Convention of Sierra Leone (BCSL) in cooperation with the Baptists in the Netherlands as well as EBM INTERNATIONAL started a new project in which 35 leaders were trained. This training teaches how to start and steer processes in order to mobilize churches and villages together for a change (transformation of society). The trainings were done by the organization Tearfund who are the experts in this field. The idea for these trainings came directly from the leaders of the BCSL.

Where can local churches be more relevant than in their surrounding? And in what way can they build on their own resources instead of furtherance from outside. This program is aiming at discovering and promoting local resources. With biblical values as its basis and with methodical tools a mutual vision is being developed for the village in a way that local needs can be addressed with personal possibilities. A pastor that has led bible studies says: "Instead of only through

my sermons people now can discover biblical truths on their own. Everyone can contribute something to the common understanding, also kids and the elderly." The Bible studies are the first step to content wise and methodically awaken awareness for the program.

Pastor Titus Kamara and Pastor Conteh were trained with this program in 2010 already and have made their own experiences with their churches. Pastor Paul Conteh tells the following story from his church:



Offering in the African service

"We were building our church when in one of our Bible studies we were talking about how to discover your own possibilities: "What has God given us in this place?" And so we started listing our possibilities, one by one. We discovered a professional mason in our church who volunteered to oversee the construction of the church and the production of the bricks. He did all of that without getting paid so we saved thousands of euros in fees. Through the training this quiet man had heard the call to invest himself into this church and he has done a great job. We were able to erect this building with his help and the help of other members of this church only – without any further support. After this experience in our church we are looking at our surroundings and are asking ourselves how we can collaborate with the local people especially in the fields of education and health. Our church has experienced a great importance in our surroundings with our own possibilities."

God Loves Everyone

“When we go back to Germany we are leaving an entire world behind us.” This is what Sara said to one of our friends recently, and the longer I think about it the more I agree.

I ask myself for example if, when I’ll be driving on the highway in Germany, I’ll be missing following a truck full of goats and singing women wearing wrap skirts, or if I’ll be surprised when cars stop at red lights even without police men watching. There won’t be any pictures of Angela Merkel in golden frames in stores, or people getting worried an hour after losing electricity that their foods in the fridge might get rotten, or every dog is obligated to wear a microchip – all these things are unimaginable for our friends down here.

Since we’ve been here we’ve realized how empty the sidewalks in Germany are and that we as Germans are surprised if not even upset if someone knocks on our door be-

fore having called. Sara came to Malawi with an exchange program of the Theological School in Elstal with the Baptist Theological Seminary and I, as her newly wed husband, was allowed to accompany her. Through her classes and the close contact to the other students we would learn as much about ourselves and our culture as about the local culture. Often we find our limits when we see how people are treated differently or are handling money differently than we are used to it. Especially Sara is confronted with getting less respect as a woman who hasn’t borne any children in comparison with male teachers. On the other hand it’s a great opportunity for her to find access to the few female students that we have here. Teaching

methods like working in groups or presentations for the students (ages 25-50) are unfamiliar and sometimes lead to shy giggles or cluelessness at the same time though they bring forth unimagined talents and excitement.

Despite all cultural differences we again and again observe how similar we are in our human needs and feelings and we are learning at the same time to be more merciful with ourselves and with others. It feels good to learn that God loves everyone despite their origin, education, and culture, and that He takes our desires and needs seriously.


EQUATORIAL GUINEA, CAMEROON, CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

Central African Republic

- For a blessed ministry of the alumni of the Bible School in Mokong/Cameroon and for the new Bible School students.
- For an end of the terrors of the Boko Haram cult.
- For Roland Godom, leader of the Technical Center in Garoua/Cameroon and for our missionary Nathan Minard.
- For an end of the restlessness in the Central African Republic, for reconciliation between the different religions, and for encouraging experiences among the churches.



On the Brink of Chaos

You are a blessing to us! The keyword will always be THANK YOU when I'm telling you about the things that are happening in Cuba. It is of invaluable worth how God is using you to accompany us in this adventure of building His kingdom. We are always in awe of how churches in Cuba are growing although – or maybe because – the circumstances of our work as missionaries are so difficult.

As long as I can remember our country has been threatened by hurricanes; harvests are destroyed and famines are the consequence. We've also been experiencing other hurricanes. The consequences of these however are not destructive for the church in Cuba. In 1. Corinthians 3:9 Paul compares the church of God to a field. God's agriculture has been happening in Cuba for the last half century under a constantly raging political and ideological hurricane. Since then this hurricane threatened to destroy the field but the result is quite different. In the past 25 years, God's kingdom has been growing and has brought fruits 30 times, 60 times, and 100 times. Is it possible that social disasters and economical and political oppression are a positive influence on the church instead of a harmful one? Even in the ancient church in Jerusalem up until the church in China

today we can see this phenomenon repeating itself.

Obviously it's not comfortable to live under a raging hurricane. Not only due to the pressure and the dangers and the limits that are coming from the outside, but there is also chaos and endangered stability inside the church. It's difficult to build church structures because of too much spontaneity and autonomy, sometimes even in an anarchical way. Everything is happening so quickly and coincidentally. The process of choosing, training, appointing, and confirming of leaders is not as structured as in other countries. In addition to this, there are a lot of leaders that we have invested in that are now leaving the country due to well-known reasons. Chaos is the term that describes our lives and our ministry perfectly. We are also experiencing a type of isolation from the rest of the worldwide church on a certain level due to lack of structural, institutional, and theological points of contact. A certain degree of alienation is unavoidable. We are doing our best and the situation is equally chaotic and beneficial.

All these inadequacies are frustrating. As much as we are fighting it,

we also had to learn to live with it. We prayed and God gave the same answer as He did to Paul: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2. Corinthians 12:9)

If there weren't any multiplications at the brink of the chaos or if I had to choose between chaotic growth or systematic preservation, I'd definitely choose chaotic growth though it shows my weakness but it also accentuates God's power.

Pray to God that in the midst of the closely upcoming changes of winds which have been predicted for our island we can still be brave and prefer growth even though stability and comfort are the attractive alternative.

God Writes His Story among the Quechua

Everything started about 30 years ago when a young and shy man called Adrián Campero from the High Andes of Peru came to Lima to pursue his luck. The Quechua man had alcohol problems, he was unemployed and simply at the lowest point in his life. There he heard God's calling. He gave his life to God, studied theology, and from then on only had his people, the Quechua, on his heart.

Adrián Campero started the missionary work among the Quechua at zero. There were many challenges and difficulties to overcome. But his passion, his love, his willingness to do God's will brought forth about 60 churches and ministries up to today.

It is impressive to see how the gospel has changed the lives of many Quechua completely. They used to grow mainly potatoes and barley as their staple which they could sell to big breweries. The monoculture was not good for the soils. Alcohol often controlled the lives of the people. This would lead to more impoverishment, bad nutrition, breaking of the families, and missing perspectives on life.

But the more Quechua people gave their lives to Christ and turned

their eyes on God, society started to change. People were trained by missionaries to grow different types of grain on small fields. One of them for example is Chia, a 'new' and most in demand type of grain in the whole world. From this time

on there are more harvests, more variety, better health, less alcohol consumption, and less poverty. Family life has improved, new values define the interactions, and the Quechua have a hopeful perspec-

tive in life. It's great to see how the gospel doesn't only have a spiritual impact but also brings changes in society up to surrounding regions.

The missionary work among the Quechua is designed the Quechan way and is therefore very successful with them. There are about 50 Quechua pastors and missionaries at

work. They are being trained and accompanied by Adrián Campero and his team. These missionaries encourage and strengthen the churches and they are helping them to fulfill the missionary command.

A strategic vision for the next ten years has been developed. An important part is to intensify the training for the pastor and the missionaries. It aims to be more systematic, more extensive, and more filled with content. For this to happen they need a "Quechua Baptist Workshop", everything with "Quechua DNA". The deadline for preparations and planning is the fall of 2016. The trainings will be held in Abancay, Curahuasi, and Yanaoca. The goal is to have more and better trained Quechua missionaries so they can bring the gospel to 50 more villages and do more church planting in the next 10 years.

Miriam Pizzi, a social worker, writes to donors in Europe about her blessed work with children and their families. Those families are from slums in Mendoza area and are participating in different programs in the social center. This offered help is appreciated and fruitful.

Dear brothers and sisters and friends in Europe,

We are happy and grateful to God for your support. It was surely a great effort from your side to collect all the donations. We are also grateful for your prayers. They are supporting our staff and contribute to the working of the Holy Spirit in the children of the families that are often marked by alcoholism, poverty, crime, and violence.

We are reaching children from very poor parts of town and are offering different programs to them and their families: PEPE preschool project, daily distribution of food for 250 people, distribution of clothes, health care, training for youth and women (mothers).

Our "happy hour" with the kids ("La Hora Feliz") is mission minded, as well as the small groups with the youth and the Bible study with prayer.

We had the same focus when organizing the Christmas party. We didn't just want to give the kids presents but also desired to tell them the wonderful news about the birth of Jesus. We had a meeting with the parents where the missionaries explained the parents' responsibilities and their need for Jesus and His leadership in their daily lives. Everyone listened attentively and some even asked for Bibles and shared different prayer requests. Others now want to participate in regular Bible studies.

Every child got a beautiful and colorful devotional calendar with shiny pages. They were saying that these kinds of books look like "more expensive" which they'd never get from their parents. Of course they also got some sweets.

Argentina

One of the MANNA kids, Anibal, is seven years old. His parents are drug addicts. They said: "We are so grateful for the love you are giving our son." – The circumstances of Anibal's life though are only changing little by little. It will take time until the love of Christ will have changed his life completely.



Cuba

The church in La Perla realized that many kids would come to school without breakfast. Three times a week now, they are given food and a glass of warm milk with a Bible story told that is relatable to their daily life.



Brazil

The staff of the deaf project celebrated 10 years of CAIS with their kids, youths, and adults. The church in Ijuí organized a happy service of thanksgiving to appreciate especially the deaf. The kids made music in sign language.

What are we praying for?

- For the MANNA staff and the churches that are lovingly taking care of the kids, and for the contacts to the families, for wisdom and love while interacting with them.
- For the families of the MANNA kids so they would know and accept God's love.
- For a change of life situations for the kids and youths in Cuba. It is marked by poverty, crime, drug dealing, and spiritualism.
- For the youths who visit the kids of the families at their homes to teach them biblical lessons.
- For the deaf: That they will have a chance to be acknowledged and integrated in the community, and for the staff to prepare the deaf for it well.

In the hilly areas of the district of Telangana in India you will often find the tribe of the Banjara. Their lives are defined by hard farm labor. For this they also travel through the country. Unfortunately, the education of the children is therefore often neglected.

Our three preschools (Balwadis) in the southern parts of India want to help these kids to learn their ABCs. The farm workers can bring their kids (ages up to five) to one of our Balwadi where they get all day classes and care. They are learning the alphabet (in English as well as Telugu), numbers, and rhymes. They also get lunch, can take a nap in the afternoon, and still have enough time to play and romp around. Every three months they are checked by a doctor and receive additional vitamins when necessary. This way we can prevent malnutrition and malnourishment which are a big problem among the people of this tribe. The physical and spiritual health of these people is very important to us.

Each preschool has a group of 10 to 30 kids which is taught by one teacher. There is also a kitchen assistant who provides the kids with food and drinks as well as with hygienic matters. Once a year the teachers participate in a training in order to improve and broaden their abilities and their knowledge.

The absolute high light for the kids is always the Christmas picnic. There's a huge dinner, there are games, and especially the present for each child. Most of the time the kids get nice clothing. The little kids get a good and solid basis for primary school when going to these preschools for a year or two.

Stories Written by Life

Four year old Rahul was brought by his mother to the Christian Medical College & hospital (CMC) in Ludhiana, a city in northern India. For 15 days he endured heavy stomach

cramps, a high fever, and constant diarrhea. He had been checked in a different hospital before this one but hadn't been successfully treated.

Rahul's mom didn't know what to do. So she brought him to us, helpless and desperate. Rahul's condition was critical. The diagnosis was a heavy gastro-intestinal inflammation caused by malnourishment. Due to the excellent medical care under the leadership of my colleague Dr. Gurmeet Kaur though, his condition stabilized. Now he is feeling better.

Rahul has a very poor background. He lives with his mother, his grandmother, and his uncle in a small hut just outside the city, in the slum. The whole family is making money as „garbage dealers“ – earning less than 200 rupees a day which is equivalent to 2.50 EUR. They are living on the poverty line and have not experienced help from the outside.

The Department of Social Welfare in our hospital offers financial support and counseling to patients from poor families. This way we were able to help Rahul and his family. We thank every donor who has contributed to this wonderful work.

India – With all your Senses

My First Trip to India

In January 2016, Pastor Christoph Haus, three other travelers, and I started our trip to India. The purpose of this trip was our annual meeting with our 15 partner organizations of EBM INTERNATIONAL in India and visiting many other EBM projects like the volunteer program.

We left Berlin at -11°C (~ 12°F) and arrived in the region Andhra at 35°C (~ 95°F). Quick change from winter coat to t-shirt! I also had to quickly get used to the Indian food. Everything was spicy but luckily there was always rice and bread. Dessert was often a very sweet pastry, the very opposite of the main dish. The local fruits were a personal high light.

The first few days we spent in Gotlam at „Bridge of Hope (BoH)“ where we celebrated the 25th anniversary of BoH with our leaders,

staff, and kids with music, dancing, and a big feast. It was impressive to learn about how many staff members have worked here over a period of 10 years. The first project of BoH started with a church, following a children's home and a hospital specializing on eye surgery. Up until today they've added a school for sewing and computers. With time, the site has grown due to the demands. The founder Dr. Benjamin and his wife were blessed over the years and have passed on this ministry due to their age to the next generation.

The following conference with 15 Indian partners of EBM INTERNATIONAL was still emotionally refreshing although it was 35°C in the shade. It was exciting to hear which goals were achieved and what type of challenges had been mastered in the past year. >>

The following days we drove with our mini busses to the east side of India down to Chennai. The streets are filled with adventurous traffic. People just drive all over the available lines. Now I know why most of the busses didn't have their exterior mirrors and why you can't live without a horn.

We visited social projects, hospitals, children's homes, sewing schools, preschools, feeding of the poor, eye clinics, a leper colony, primary schools, schools for IT, and churches. Often we were greeted with dancing, singing, necklaces of flowers, and fresh coconut water.

When feeding the poor at the „Milk And Egg Program“ of our partner organization ALMA, I realized that it's not about a short term plan to alleviate the needs but even more so to gain the trust of the local church so they understand that through this program and others their children are offered a chance to a different and better future.

I was changed by this trip. I was a guest to people who themselves are unimaginably poor and still radiate such deep warmth and who take it as an immense joy to make me presents. I was deeply moved a lot of times.

One of these moments was in a village where they gave us necklaces of flowers. These were not made of bought flowers but of the ones that were available in this village. This way I had a necklace that smelled strongly like dried fish. It was a challenge for my nose but these people were so warm and made me feel so welcome – that was the most important thing!

Throughout the duration of our trip we got to meet many churches and families that are dedicated to fighting poverty. I'm humbled by the power and love of so many pastors and church members who are engaged in those projects and they make me question my own dedication in my personal life.

Despite great poverty and very simple ways of living I've seen many laughing faces and brightly and colorfully dressed people. Seeing, feeling, smelling, tasting, special landscape, and personal contacts – I will be carrying these impressions with me for a while. I've returned with a grateful and humble heart.

Through the Milk and Egg program we are able to feed about 200 kids and six pregnant women twice a week with milk and eggs. Thus they receive enough protein and nourishment that is important for their development or the production of mother's milk.

A relatively small cataract operation can have an amazing affect in the lives of many poor and penniless people that have almost gone blind by the cataract. There are checks in the eye camps, and for the surgeries the patients are brought to the basis hospital. Then they are able to see again.
