Großhansdorf, Germany and was excited about experiencing God's work during the mission council: "I'm encouraged to serve in Germany when I see how God works through you in the rest of the world."

This is the core of our mission work worldwide: It is not a one-way street from Europe to the global south. Today we are living world mission partner-like and at eye level. Nobody has everything. And nobody has nothing. Everyone got something. That's what we're sharing. To honor God, for the wellbeing of people so that many will find their way to Jesus.

Iranian Church in Turkey

New Staff Member

Monday night in June in Manisa, a small town 50 km north of Izmir: 30 adults and 10 kids are gathered in a living room for a church service – they are all Iranian refugees. The church is singing many songs, reading in the Bible, and listening to the good news. Peri is the leader of this small Turkish Baptist Church in Izmir. She is originally from Iran but has been living in Turkey for many years now. She is fluent in Farsi and Turkish. She is in a way the soul of this church. She translates when someone holds the devotion in Turkish and she is a counselor for the church members. Peri acts as a social worker for refugees as well: she accompanies them to the authorities,

visits the sick, helps families to collect clothes and materials for school, and helps with other problems. She checks on the Iranian brothers and sisters to make sure they are going to work and contacts the employer when there are problems.

Peri receives a small fee but she also feels called to serve. This is a very encouraging example and a prayer request at the same time.

Samuel became a Christian when he was still young. In 2014 him and his wife and daughter came to our mission church. At that time the family didn't have a relationship with God. They had had bad experiences with Christian leaders who had taken wrong decisions and who were

bad examples. The family was emotionally not stable and full of conflicts which affected their marriage. In the midst of doubt and spiritual warfare a renewal process started in Samuel, bearing fruit in the last couple of months in every family member. He had heard the calling of the Holy Spirit and didn't just want to be the one sitting on a church bench on Sundays. Now Samuel is part of a men's group that study the Bible to discover their gifts and talents in order to serve the Lord.

His wife Yunia also reacted to this renewal process. She started working in the kids ministry at church and she also wanted to work in a discipleship program. She was being prepared for that and now helps a woman in church that is new to the faith.

Their daughter Thalía (13) gave her testimony at her baptism in April: "In the past couple of months I've felt God's presence in a very special way. I'm not sure how to put it into words but God has been working deep inside of me. In this process I didn't feel worthy of calling myself a Christian. It was as if my Christian life until then was just a simple routine of going to church on Sundays.

I realized that I wasn't living my life in the fear of God. All of this I brought to God in prayer and gave all my life to Christ. I told him: 'My Lord, do whatever you want to do with my life.'"

We thank God that he has given us wisdom and help in the most difficult of times to accompany this family. We are especially grateful for the work of the Holy Spirit in us. Missionaries Sergio Gómez and Regina Mendoza

"My name is Dayron, I'm 30 years old and I was raised in a Christian home. Up until a year ago I wasn't able to see Jesus in my life. My attitude toward him and toward everything connected to Christianity was complete rejection.

At birth doctors detected a heart defect. My case was so complicated that no doctor was brave enough to operate on me. My parents were desperate and my mother turned to God for refuge. When I was four years old though I underwent surgery successfully

so I could lead a pretty normal life. When I was 17 I got a degree in computer science. I started to work and doing things that were damaging to me. I stayed up all night, drank alcohol, took drugs, and hung out with the wrong crowd. I slept with married women and I felt my life spiraling downwards into chaos. I made experiences with the spiritual world and was tortured by demons, time and again.

Last year we received a Mexican pastor in our house, a man with a strong faith who we offered a room to sleep in. After a couple of days, he told me that he had felt demons in the room. He said they were my demons. The only possible way to get rid of those demons would be to really accept Jesus as my Lord and Savior. That really touched me and I started thinking about everything. For the first time in my life I decided to ask Jesus into my heart. From that night on I was never harassed by demons again but I felt great peace in my heart. God has shown me his great mercies. Today I thank Jesus Christ from the bottom of my heart that he has made my life new and that he's given me so many opportunities and blessings in such a short time."

"Once I came to visit Roxana. She is 32 years old and she has four kids. Her husband drinks a lot of alcohol and often she would drink with him. When I visited her for the first time I went with her dad who

had only recently given his life to Christ. She was a bit scared and we realized that she really needed God in her life. I told her of the good news and immediately she accepted Jesus as her Lord and Savior. Since then she's been a true follower of our Lord. She also enrolled in a discipleship program with my wife Ana Iris. She is being trained

"Here We Are!" – At the Ends of the World



About 700 people gathered in "the nowhere", high up in the Andes in Peru. We were driving for hours without seeing a single person even less villages, then all of a sudden the big yellow mission tent was right in front of us. This year again the Quechua Baptists celebrated their four-day mission conference.

On the first day about 150 people were walking around singing loudly and carrying banners saying "Here we are!". They walked through two villages inviting everybody they met to this big event, kept walking steep roads up and down, crossing a river, and finally arriving at the campground.

The Quechua Baptists enjoyed fellowshiping together. There were people from about 20 different mission stations and churches at the conference. They cooked and ate together – what seems to be logical. But they only had fire places in the ground and they put big pots on there. Different teams filled the plates with food while everyone

stood in line. No one was pushing or complaining. Everyone was just happy to be there. The program was varied. There were church services, sport competitions, and a lot of music. The sermons were encouraging and inviting everyone to surrender their life to Christ. The Quechua were very open. Many of them talked about their problems openly, kneeled down and asked for prayer. The evening services usually took till midnight because the musicians were asked to repeat their songs. It would get really cold at night but it didn't bother anyone. The Quechua would sleep in the trucks or on mattress put on the ground. The highlight of this event was the baptism. Five pastors walked into the river with 50 people

and baptized them in the bitter cold water. Actually there were 40 more people who had wanted to get baptized but they didn't have the chance to get a ride to the campground. The faith and passion for Jesus of the Quechua is exciting. They live with a great commitment and a strong dependency as well as a close relationship to God.

Now that the number of people that were baptized has grown and many churches and stations have been founded it's time for a new stage. We have the vision of starting 50 new missions in villages. We need to create good conditions for the new believers to be accompanied. We need well trained missionaries and the level of staff training has to be increased. Starting in 2018, the new founded Quechua Bible School will be starting with classes. It's about high time!

The Quechua want to show they are united. That's why they are founding the association "Quechua Baptists". They are working on the statute and they are applying for corporate laws. We will keep updating on how God is building his church in Peru.

Social center Diadema/Brazil

During the devotions the kids are invited to start a relationship with Jesus. Many ask for prayer for their families. Family members are drug addicts or they are sick and unemployed which causes hopeless situations. Often these kids grow up in a violent surrounding.

"I have thought a lot about death and I had wanted to die. I wasn't sure what would happen after death and I was scared that nobody would miss me. Since I've given my life to Christ he has changed me. Today I hardly ever argue with my parents. I have many friends and I try not to lie but help wherever I can."

"A woman invited us to church. We accepted Christ into our lives and are happy now. My husband has been freed from his addiction to alcohol. He is a new person now! I thank God for touching our lives."

What are we praying for?

- That the kids' families would experience God's love through the social center.
- For the many active staff in the Kids Bible clubs and the sports ministry.
- For the spiritual growth of the new Christians in the new founded churches in Cuba.
- For healing for the kids and their families.
- For more leaders that can help build up the church in La Perla.



Hunger – What is That?

According to a report of the World Hunger Help experts are distinguishing between two types of hunger, acute hunger and chronic hunger. Acute hunger means malnutrition over a limited time span like for example through droughts, wars, and catastrophes. Chronic hunger means a long term malnutrition. Chronic hunger also amounts to the biggest part of the famine in the world.

We can see a scary amount of people suffering from malnutrition in India as well. More than 200 million people don't have enough to eat among which are 61 million children.

The Salvation Army wants to counteract malnutrition in India with projects feeding the poor. EBM INTERNATIONAL supports these kind of projects in Mumbai, Delhi, and Calcutta. We recently received a letter from the Salvation Army from Mumbai:

"In Mumbai, the metropolis of millions, there are many poor and homeless people that are suffering from starvation. There are three places in Mumbai where the Salvation Army offers these people a warm meal on a daily basis through a feeding the poor program. Beside distributing food people are being told the word of God as well. This is often the first contact with the Christian faith for many and a space where they can experience comfort, support, and encouragement.

Guddu Pillai (26) saw his parents die when he was only eight years old. Since birth he has had crippled legs though this didn't hinder him from making a living by playing

electrical instruments on the street as well as he could. When the Salvation Army distributed food close to where he was "working" a woman approached him and asked if she could provide Guddu with a daily meal. Since then he's been coming every day and one of the staff, officer Wadala of the Salvation Army, has been spending time with him. He's been praying with him, explaining the word of God, and convincing him of the love of Christ. We are very grateful that Guddu has accepted Jesus as his Lord and Savior."

Overall the Salvation Army daily provides a warm meal for 200 people in Mumbai. Because of the considerate care of the staff people have their first contact with the Christian faith and can experience comfort, support, and encouragement.

Oasis of Hope for Girls

According to the motto "Lifting the poor and needy" the Salvation Army has founded a girls' home many years ago in Gudivada in the south east of India called "Oasis of Hope for Girls".

Its purpose is to give girls a home and support them as well as possible with their personal developments as well as challenge their schooling and impact their faith in Jesus Christ.

Originally the only kids accepted were from poor farmer families of the Salvation Army. In the meantime, though they have been taking care of mostly Hindu kids. The majority of the 40 girls living there now have experienced suffering either because their families are so poor and they had to beg or work on the fields or because violence and family crises were present in their lives. In this home they are allowed to just be kids again. They don't have to worry about food or clothes and how they will make it through the next day.

The Salvation Army puts an emphasis on supporting a school education. It is very important to them that the girls can go to school regularly and that they get a good diploma. Just this year there were nine girls with excellent grades that were moved up to eleventh grade. This way they are prepared well for an independent life. In their free time the girls have the chance to play together. They can talk or be on their own. In the mornings and evenings there is a small devotion and on Sundays everyone goes to church. There they sing together, they pray, they learn Bible verses together and there are Bible classes being offered to them. This way they learn about the Christian faith.

Katikala is one of the girls that lives here and attends school. She is one of the best students in the 10th grade. She comes from a Hindu family. Her father has died and her mother works as a day labourer. They used to live in a straw hut in the slums. There was never enough money to feed the family because Katikala also has two younger siblings. Therefore, Katikala's mom brought her to the girls' home so she can be taken care of and go to school. Mother and daughter enjoy close contact still. Katikala got to know Jesus Christ and is fully engaged in Christian activities like reading the Bible, singing, and praying at the devotions and the church services.

Overall EBM INTERNATIONAL supports for more children's homes of the Salvation Army in India.

Christian Hospital – Help for the Poor



Eye camps for eye exams

The Christian hospital in Serango was founded by Canadian missionaries in 1928 in the south eastern hilly region of Orissa, a state in India. At that time malaria, dengue fever, and black water fever were widely spread. It was the goal of these missionaries to ease the pain of the people of that region that had a 90% population of Adivasi. Still up to today the hospital offers medical care for the needy and the socially disadvantaged: Christians, Hindi, casteless – all of them are to receive help equally.

Ranjeet Limma (35) arrived at the hospital all bloody at the end of last year. While chopping wood he had cut himself with the ax in the arm. His condition was critical since he had lost a lot of blood. Thanks to the surgery they were able to sew muscles and skin together again and he was able to leave the hospital ten days later. Ranjeet too has come from poor circumstances and is very

grateful for the care and help that has been given to him free of charge.

In the last couple of years, the hospital has had a great development and enjoys a good image also due to the excellently trained staff. The hospital exists of a main house, an eye clinic, and a supply center for mothers and children. Just in 2016 about 15 000 patients were treated here. In addition to that there are so called “eye camps” happening here. A team of doctors from the general hospital and the eye clinic go to the surrounding villages and schools in order to check and treat adults and kids, if necessary also in the hospital.

AKKAGARIPETA, PITHAPURAM, TALLAREVU

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“Angel Children’s Home” in Akkagaripeta

The father of these four kids is an alcoholic and he’s violent. They weren’t fed nor clothed at home and the family didn’t have enough money for rent. Two years ago these kids were brought to the children’s home by the pastor. Now they have everything they need in life: love, a good home, regular meals, and a school education.



Christian Medical Centre (AMA) in Pithapuram

Three years ago Perumalla lost her eyesight. In addition to that she was suffering from cervical cancer. She was brought to a hospital and underwent surgery. Due to her economic situation and her missing eyesight the hospital waived her fees.



CREAM-Campus in Tallarevu

Among the children’s home, a daycare, a Medium School, and church work CREAM is supporting a vocational training center where young people receive training in areas like computers, electrical engineering, engine technology, and sewing.

Eleven Days in Cameroon

Incomparable, Exciting, Breathtaking

Cameroon is always worth a trip. You can also never compare one trip with another. We got to Douala to see that our connecting flight to Garoua had already left without us, three hours before the scheduled time. So we changed our plans for the north and flew to Maroua the next day.

I was quite impressed to be in the far north again for the second time after 2013. For the first time I was able to visit the Technical Center Maroua (CTM) and the girls' school Saare Tabitha for a bit longer as well as spend time with the project managers Lambert Betché and Cathérine Kolyang. It is impressive what a difference these project make in the lives of young people. The German Foreign Office still issues travel warnings for that whole

region. Europeans are advised against longer stays. Overall though the situation has calmed down. People in that region have found new hope, at least in Maroua which is the capitol in that area. At the border to Nigeria there are still many attacks. Young people blow themselves up in public areas in front of Christian and Muslim houses of God. This region needs our prayers and our support. We need to show young people that are enrolled in Baptist Schools or vocational centers or are taken care of in hospitals our support and our connection.

We took a car going to Garoua. On our return we took a soldier with us. He was on his way to a place where an attack had happened, close to the border. That way we had a spontaneous escort that had actually been offered to us by the head of the brigade at our arrival at the airport in Maroua. He had been impressed by Christoph Haus' insight and the networking of the local people that are working for EBM INTERNATIONAL. It's wonderful to see how established our projects are in the hands of the locals.

In Garoua we visited our missionaries Sarah Bosniakowski and Nathan Minard. Even though Sarah has been in Cameroon only since

January she's settled quite well. Naturally she loves helping out where help is needed. Taking initiative to be close to people is helping her to find her place in this world. Nathan is active in the Technical Center in Garoua (CTG) and other places. The official inauguration of the buildings for the new training courses took place at the end of June. They already had 13 people graduate as specialists in the areas of hotel and catering.

At the end we had a conference in Douala with 13 staff, missionaries,

I'm looking forward the most to commitment and acknowledgement in Christ that goes beyond borders as well as trust shown to me and the feeling of having things in common when people act in concert. I'm looking forward to seeing the

Help for the Poor and the Sick

In the last couple of months more than 500 people have benefited from our food aids that are being distributed through the LYDIA projects. In most families someone is affected by HIV and AIDS. Often there are

also disabled and poor people so they are extremely needy. With LYDIA we were able to help a pastor and his wife who are responsible for three churches in Minjale (35km away from Zomba). He was discovered with an open tuberculosis and was brought to a hospital. When he was being discharged the staff at LYDIA noticed that his wife couldn't give him the needed care and that their kids were living too far away. One of their sons is studying theology at the Baptist Seminary in Lilongwe. With the support of a team of LYDIA from the Baptist Church this couple is taken care of on a regular basis with the most basic needs.

The team taking care of Eddah Katunga has noticed a woman who is HIV positive when they were doing house visitations in the villages. When she started taking the antiretroviral drugs her husband left her and they got a divorce. They had never had children and now this woman was on her own. Because of the staff and their care for Eddah she would take her medication regularly and

have other basic needs met. Her health status has improved a lot.

We have been able to help a total of 795 students from the time we started supporting LYDIA financially in 2002. Most of the kids and youth have been supported from grade six onward. This year there are 33 kids in the program. We are supporting twelve of those girls. It is our desire to especially promote girls in the future.

One of the first boys that has benefited from the support is highly qualified manager today. He's leading a support facility for orphans and working as a freelance photographer.

Besides these encouraging stories the staff of the LYDIA project also go through painful situations. Several people they have cared for over a long period of time have passed away in the past couple of weeks. It's a big emotional challenge for the staff not to lose courage and still to have strength for their daily work.

EQUATORIAL GUINEA, MOZAMBIQUE, CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

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Equatorial Guinea

Many leaders have evolved from the church planting project in Movún. A terrible storm in February destroyed the building badly. Thanks to an immediate help from EBM INTERNATIONAL from their Disaster Relief Fund they were able to pay the biggest part of the costs.



Mozambique

Our missionary Sara Marcos is facing a lot of challenges in the social center in Macia. The list of diseases that the kids have is endless. AIDS, physical disabilities, and emotional disorders. They are also short of trained staff.



Central African Republic

We especially support the theological training at the four Bible Schools. This work our brothers and sisters have continued despite all the restlessness in the country. We also keep supporting and promoting women, youth work as well as fighting the consequences of the civil war through humanitarian help.
